

## A PPIE SOUVENIR HUB?

Last month I was asked to look into the object shown with an eye to appraising its value as a die for some PPIE souvenir.

I photographed it and emailed images to several PCNS members known to take an interest in PPIE material, but with little feedback, save that it might be worth \$50–100 depending on how it is marketed to PPIE collectors. My own opinion at the outset was that it might be worth twice that — possibly more, but only if one could determine what it was used to produce.



Look closely, and note that the “die” face is not in reverse. This die could actually have been used as a hub for producing dies rather than for striking souvenir pieces directly!

Finding a matching souvenir took a little internet search time to turn up one button or lapel pin with matching design, showing a lock on the Panama Canal.



The hub itself has no maker's mark, though it has an interesting tooling design, most likely from repeated use in a press rather than an intentional design.

I suspect the depicted lock with a lighthouse is the *Gatun Locks* of the canal.

This blue-enameled button or pin souvenir probably was produced by the many thousands for PPIE, but I have been unable find out much about it.
