

## MARCH PROGRAM REPORT

### *National Commemorative Medals (NCMs)*

Bob Somers presented an illustrated talk introducing us to this little-known series of official medals. NCMs are viewed as a kind of successor to the commemorative coinage of the 1890s to 1950s. Some now consider this series to start in the late 1800s, ranging in size from 21.5 mm to 76.3 mm.

*Howard L. Turner* wrote a series of articles in *The Numismatist* (July 1968, Sept 1977, Nov 1985, Nov 1989) cataloging the NCM series, in which he included 49 issues struck in multiple metals.

Two other authors wrote books on the series in 2008, expanding on Turner's list. *John T. Dean* catalogued 69 medals in date order, while *William Swoger* published a massive tome — over 3X as many pages as Dean — which arranges 71 medals using his own categories.

Bob noted that, while Swoger goes into more detail on some issues, one is forced to use Swoger's index to find anything in his book due to his nonintuitive arrangement.

The basic criteria for NCMs are that they are

- (1) struck by the US Mint,
- (2) issued with Congressional approval, and
- (3) sold by nonprofits to raise funds.

Bob noted that at times each of these three criteria has been ignored.

By the early 1970s, there were questions in Congress about the NCM program — similar to the complaints which doomed the old commemorative half-dollar series — urging that NCMs be limited to subjects which were truly of national significance. It was also pointed out that the US Mint should not simply be in competition with private minting businesses to produce private medals for public sale.

## MARCH MEMBER EXHIBITS

Mark — from his latest trip to Mexico, a 500 Peso note of 1832, the earliest Masonic token recorded for Mexico, and a 1909 Great White Fleet medal for its arrival in Guatemala.

Mary — Seleucid coins, two nice bronzes and a silver hemidrachm bearing a lifelike portrait of Antiochus IX.

Federico — token of the Eel River Valley Lumber Co. struck by Patrick C° of SF, and a 1789 Guatemalan proclamation medal.

Bob — Dartmouth College Bicentennial NCM, and a 1971 NCM for Ohio Northern University.

Ken — 1¢ and 50¢ Hawaiian coins, along with several WWII Hawaii *overprint notes* which had been saved from circulation.

Ed — Finland mints sets with lighthouse designs.

Bill — 1886 New York Fire Department badge from the “Liberty Statue” dedication event, and a book on Audrey Munson, a model used by A.A.Weinman and other artists of the PPIE era.

Herb — China Freedom Dollar, privately struck in support of demonstrators in China, using a 1920s Chinese silver dollar as the planchette, with the under-type still visible.

Dan — 1948 Gold Discovery centennial medal, *SS San Francisco* lifesaving medal, Golden Gate Bridge 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary medal, and an early 1920s book titled *Money*, which identifies PCNS with the author Francis Amasa Walker. (Stephen saw an earlier printing and suspects the PCNS reference may be how the author chose to present his credentials as a numismatist if he was a member.)
