1930 Oregon Battleship so-called dollar

General Meeting

President Miles called the meeting to order at 8:10.

Members present included: Bill Hyder, Dan Hipple, Herb Miles, Stephen Huston, Mary Lannin, and Ed Treuting.

Guests included Marybeth Grass, Audrey Grass, and Suzanna Abbott.

Herb Miles presented his program, Franklin Delano Roosevelt and the March of Dimes.

FDR contracted polio at the age of 39. Polio first came to the attention of America in 1916 with an outbreak in New York. 27,000 were infected with 6,000 deaths. FDR contracted the disease in 1921 and dedicated his wealth to finding a cure.

He bought the Warm Springs Spa in 1924 when he found relief bathing in its waters. He started the Warm Springs Foundation for Polio both to help others stricken with the disease and to support efforts to find a cure. He held an annual fund raising event for his Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. In 1939, he asked Americans to help, even if they could only contribute a dime. Within two weeks, 6 million dimes were received and Eddie Cantor coined the term, March of Dimes.

The March of Dimes became one of the most successful foundations having found a vaccine for polio and then moving on to other challenges. Identification of Fetal Alcohol Syndrome and development of the APGAR test for newborns are two other successes.

Bill Hyder shared a Roosevelt Dime set in an old Capital Plastics holder.

Ed Treuting shared several lighthouse themed pieces including a silver proof 5 Pound Millennium Lighthouse coin from Alderney, a looped San Nicolas medal from 1928, a large Portuguese medal with a lighthouse, and an elongated penny with a lighthouse.

Mary Lannin shared two Antiochus Hierax from 276 – 227 B.C., one overstruck Philip I, and one Barbaric “Antiochus” drachm from Asia Minor ca. late 3rd or 2nd century.

Dan Hipple shared a 1903 Jefferson gold commemorative dollar and a silver 1916 California agricultural award medal.
